INNOVATION FROM THE INSIDE OUT - EVENT REPORT



Last week, HeritageHUB was a key partner in the delivery of 'Innovation from the Inside Out'. This event was aimed at Built Environment Training Providers to demonstrate how they can enhance their curriculums through the use of high tec e-based resources and 3-D simulators, effective partnership and knowledge transfer projects and the value of bringing mastercraft skills back into the classroom. Morning presentations were followed by 3 carouselling workshops in the afternoon. Feedback confirmed that the most enjoyable was the stonemasonry workshop which allowed delegates 40 minutes with mastercraftsman, Andy Oldfield and most people managed to carve a complete flower in that time. Feedback for the event overall was superb, and we were especially pleased to welcome delegates from colleges as far away as Southampton! We hope that more colleges will investigate how to bring traditional crafts 'back to the classroom' and allow their students the benefits that could be achieved by allowing mastercraftsmen and women a forum for passing

on their valuable experience – one delegate promised to do just that following the workshop, let's hope more follow his lead – (Result!!)

THE NVQ 3 HERITAGE SPECIALIST APPRENTICESHIP COURSE SPECIAL BLOG REPORT BY WWW.PROJECTBOOK.CO.UK

James Mott from Projectbook was invited to visit the South Coast Roof Training facility, by the founder Mike Fildes. The centre is piloting the new Specialist Apprenticeship in heritage roofing, leading to the NVQ level 3 qualification, the first of its type in the UK. The centre has been impressively kitted out with a wide variety of different rigs to work on, and even features a complete building with roof and eyebrow feature.

East Midlands based course tutor Richard Jordan (below) of <u>Jordan Heritage Roofing</u> is a very experienced and time-served slater and tiler, having been trained in traditional techniques whilst working alongside his father early on in his career. Richard is knowledgeable and clearly passionate about heritage buildings, and is widely recognised as an expert in his field. In 1999 he gained the prestigious William Morris Craft Fellowship from the Society for the Protection of Ancient Buildings (SPAB).







James' visit was on week three of a sixteen week course designed to up skill already qualified roofers. Today's session was on random and diminishing slating. When I arrived at 9:00am – they were already in full swing with Richard showing the group how to mark out a setting out rod. These students are already qualified roofers; however there are plenty of puzzled looks and much head scratching going on - heritage roofing means learning a whole new way of doing things.

"NVQ level 2 is easy" Chris from John Williams Roofing informed me, "what we are learning is far more challenging and enjoyable – give me the choice of doing a modern roof to this and I know which one I'd rather do". The sentiment was echoed by Dan O'Sullivan, who runs his own business and travels from Exeter (over 200 miles away) every week – "I spent over two years searching for training like this" he told me "this course is worth way more than the qualification".

Throughout the day the group went through all the processes: making a setting out rod, sorting the tiles, cutting and trimming, punching holes and inserting

tapered oak pegs, laying up, edge bedding and 'torching' (the process of applying a horse hair/lime mortar to the back of the batten/tile to help secure the tiles and hold the oak pegs in position.

I soon became aware of a conflict – this method of traditional tiling means that the modern thinking of nailing battens onto felt/ breathable membranes is simply not possible. When I raised the subject with Richard, he drew a large breath; perhaps I'd better leave this discussion for another blog.....

All this left me thinking that I had only just scratched the surface. The different techniques, regional variation in terms and practise is a lot to take in. So, the pupils are keen to learn, have excellent facilities and an

experienced and passionate teacher; for the students there will be many learning challenges over the next thirteen weeks – I'll return in a few weeks to see how everyone is progressing.

SPAB SEEKS SANDSTONE BUILD FOR STUDY

The Society for the Protection of Ancient Buildings will be studying the energy efficiency of a small group of historic and traditional buildings throughout 2011 and 2012, and is

seeking to identify a solid wall sandstone house that's going to be refurbished in the next few months.

The study aims to examine the building before and after refurbishment to try and offer as complete a picture as possible of the property. The results of the research will be published in order to assist people with improving the energy efficiency of other traditional buildings.

The property needs to be solid wall, sandstone, definitely undergoing significant refurbishment before next winter, preferably



listed (in which case, planning / listed building consent needs to have already been obtained) but any pre-1919 home will be considered and, of course, the owner must be wiling to participate in the study. The SPAB is flexible about the floor area of the building being sought and it can be located anywhere. ENERGY EFFICIENCY AND HISTORIC BUILDINGS: APPLICATION OF PART L OF THE BUILDING REGULATIONS TO HISTORIC AND TRADITIONALLY CONSTRUCTED BUILDINGS

This guidance provides technical advice to help prevent conflicts between energy efficiency requirements in Part L of the Building Regulations and the conservation of historic and traditionally constructed buildings. This new interim guidance has been produced to coincide with the revisions to Part L of the Buildings Regulations that came into effect on 1 October 2010. It will be published in early 2011 in a fully illustrated form. The purpose of the guidance is to help prevent conflicts between the requirements of the regulations and the conservation of historic and traditionally constructed buildings. IHBC LAUNCH WEB RESOURCE TO SUPPORT IMPORTANCE OF CONSERVATION TO NON-SPECIALISTS

The Institute of Historic Building Conservation (IHBC) has just launched a test (Beta) version of a web resource for IHBC members and other built and historic environment conservation specialists, particularly those in local government in England, to help them specify the importance of conservation to non-specialist managers or other decision makers targeting conservation services.

IHBC Chair Jo Evans said: "The website will help guide members to independent studies and statements on the importance of their professional work, whether core statutory functions or front line services supporting local communities. This is an essential evidence base, helping remind us all of the duties that must be carried out even if a conservation post is lost, and the consequences, including the scrutiny of the ombudsman, if those duties are ignored.

Crucially, the resource also provides a signpost to the widespread, but often unsung, statements of the value of our members' work by key authorities outside the heritage sector. While the statements have often been inspired specifically by the IHBC's own advocacy, they are a unique independent confirmation of the value of our work to business in particular, and society in general."

IHBC know that this is a website that is neither complete in itself, nor prefect in its content – it is a signpost rather than a library, and a stick rather than a solution – but they welcome any feedback. That may take the form of new case studies to supplement our evidence in England, draft texts for the pages that are as yet unwritten, or even suggestions for tweaks to improve the function. BALVENIE MASTERS OF CRAFT AWARDS, CELEBRATING HANDCRAFTED GOODS FROM ACROSS THE COUNTRY.

The awards scheme aims to shine a light on the talent in the field of handcrafts - working with metal, leather, wood, stone, food and drink, glass and ceramics and textiles. It is not a history project - youthful exuberance is helping to drive these skills on and making them relevant in the 21st century and commercially viable.

Joining HCA Chair **Robin Wood** on the judging panel is **Kevin McCloud**, the presenter of Channel 4's Grand Designs. Kevin has employed craftsmen in his design business, and witnessed their skill on the set of Grand Designs. It is, he says, "an enormous privilege" to watch a craftsman at work. But he is concerned for the future. "We have lost touch with the value of things," he says. "We don't understand the skills required to make things anymore."

Nominations are sought for craftspeople who uphold elements of traditional artisanship and recognise the importance of working to innovate and develop sustainable markets for their products in today's world. Nine awards will be given in total. One for each of the seven craft categories (Stone, Wood, Metal, Glass and Ceramics, Textiles, Leather, Food and Drink), one for The Balvenie Young Master of Craft 2011 (those 30 years of age and under, who symbolise the successful passing on of skills to a new generation) and one for the overall Master of Craft 2011. EU CONSULTATION ON VAT – YOUR CHANCE TO HAVE YOUR SAY!

An opportunity has arisen to express concern about the way that VAT is levied on the cost of maintenance and repairs to historic buildings (but not on replacement or new builds) in response to the European Commission Green Paper: 'Towards a simpler, more robust and efficient VAT system'. The aim of the consultation is to launch a debate on the structure of the current VAT system, ways to make it more coherent within a single market and to reduce the cost of compliance. Deadline: 31 May.

SITUATIONS VACANT

SENIOR HLF GRANTS OFFICER - EAST MIDLANDS

Applications are sought for the permanent and full time position of Senior Grants Officer in our East Midlands Team. The job holder will report to the Head of HLF East Midlands and will assess and process applications for grants in that region. This includes progress monitoring of projects undertaken by successful applicants. The post is based in Nottingham and will involve some travel across the region for site visits.

As a more experienced case worker within the team, the job holder will be responsible for handling a wide range of applications and awards for grants for major projects, as well as assisting in the formulation of HLF regional grants strategies, developing and participating in outreach activities, and pursuing other strategic objectives. The position line manages one Grants Officer and will work closely with the Casework Manager, other Grants Officers and the Development Team.

Duties include:

- * Management of the assessment and processing of grant applications, particularly large and complex cases.
- * Post award processing and monitoring of successful grant applications.
- * Providing advice and guidance to applicants and prospective applicants.
- * Line management responsibility for one Grants Officer.

UPVC WINDOWS - FOOD FOR THOUGHT FROM ACROSS THE POND

Rochester City Newspaper New York – 12Jan2011 - It's not unusual in neighborhoods throughout the city to see older wood windows stacked at the curb. Rather than restore the windows, property owners usually replace them, often with vinyl windows. Rochester is now among cities and towns across the country reviewing its ordinance regarding vinyl replacement windows. It's a hot topic among preservationists that is attracting broader public attention.

The change would be significant. While it would impact a relatively small and distinct group of properties, Rochester's approach is being closely watched by communities around the state...Many of the city's buildings - residential and commercial - are older and have windows that need attention. Vinyl replacement windows are popular because they are relatively cheap and easy to install. Educating consumers about the value of restoring older wood windows is important, says Cynthia Howk, architectural research coordinator for the Landmark Society of Western New York...But many property owners are intimidated by the necessary repairs and upkeep of older windows.

The work can be difficult, time-intensive, and require the help of an experienced window repair person, said John Schick, architect and Preservation Board member, at last week's meeting...And finding a knowledgeable craftsperson to do the work can be problematic, he said.

Highly qualified restoration people do exist in the Rochester area, Howk says, but they aren't well-known. And their work takes time, she says, and may seem costly compared to installing a vinyl window. Getting consumers to think about the long-term investment they're making might ease some of their worries, Howk says... Still, some Preservation Board members are concerned about creating restrictive guidelines, especially during a difficult economy. What difference would it make, one board member asked, if a vinyl window is used in the back of a building facing a parking lot? But Howk says taking shortcuts is not the answer. "Once those wood windows have been removed, they're probably lost forever," she says.
